

What is Autism Spectrum Disorder?

- Deficits in social communication and social interaction across multiple contexts

Ex: Failure to initiate or respond to social interactions; poorly integrated verbal and nonverbal communication; abnormalities in eye contact and body language or deficits in understanding; absence of interest in peers

- Restricted, repetitive patterns of behavior, interests, or activities

Ex: Repetitive motor movements; inflexible adherence to routines; strong attachment with unusual objects; adverse response to specific sounds or textures

- Symptoms cause clinically significant impairment in social occupational or other important areas of functioning ciation, 2013)

"Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is now defined by the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnosis and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-5) as a **single disorder** that includes disorders that were previously considered separate — autism, Asperger's syndrome, childhood disintegrative disorder and pervasive developmental disorder not otherwise specified (Mayo Clinic)."

Who Does ASD Affect?

- About 1 in 68 children (study based off of 8-year olds)
 - ➤ 1 in 42 boys
 - ➤ 1 in 189 girls
- Occurs in all racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic groups
- ❖ Boys are 4.5 times more likely to be identified with ASD than girls



Treatment and Support


There is no cure for ASD but there are therapies and treatments that can help increase a child's ability to function.

- Communication therapies (read more about speech therapy here)
- Family therapies (read more about family therapy here)
- Special diets (read more about diets here)

- Medications to help control symptoms associated with ASD (read more about medications here)

Educational Strategies/Tips for Support



- Individualized Educational Program
- Establish routines in the classroom
 - Write them down
 - Take still pictures of the task
 - Video tape them
 - Provide warning if routine change is happening
- Avoid using idioms
- Get to know the child
- Transition Support
